- 6. In response, in the presence of my wife and myself, George Marrs stated, "I'd like to sit on that jury. I'd like to help burn that s.o.b."
- 7. The foregoing statement of George Marrs appeared to me to express a strongly-held belief that Roger Coleman was guilty of the crimes of which he was accused, and was not said lightly or in jest.
- 8. This conversation took place approximately one to two months before the trial of Roger Coleman for rape and capital murder.
- 9. I am not personally acquainted with Roger Coleman, nor am I related to him by blood or marriage.
