ONCE CHARGED WITH MURDER.

Death of Herbert H. Hayden. Methodist Minister in Connecticut.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 13.—Herbert H. Hayden died at his home here this morning aged 57 years, after a prolonged illness. Mr. Hayden was graduated at Wesleyan University, afterward became a Methodist minister, and was settled in

North Madison, Conn.
While there he was accused of the murder of Mary Stannard, which led in 1870 to one of the most famous murder trials in Connecticut. It involved a trip paid for by the State of Prof. Edward S. Dana of Yale to Europe to investigate the properties of arsenic whch ligared in the trial. The jury disagreed and Mr. Hayden was released on bonds, which were afterward canceled.
